Presidential Candidate Vice and Virtue Poll:

Swing State Evangelical and Catholic Perceptions of Donald J. Trump and Joseph R. Biden

September 7, 2020

Survey Design and Data Analysis :

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Survey Aims and Key Content

This survey was designed to measure the 2020 Presidential voting intentions of swing state (Florida, Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania or Wisconsin) Evangelical and Catholic registered voters. In addition, the survey measured respondents' perceptions of the moral character of Donald J. Trump and Joseph R. Biden. Given the survey's focus on Christian voters, moral character was defined using the Biblical concepts of the 7 cardinal virtues (kindness, generosity, humility, chastity, modesty, diligence and patience) and the 7 deadly sins (lust, sloth, greed, wrath, gluttony, envy and pride). After rating the two candidates separately on each sin and virtue, respondents answered a series of additional questions including (a) who, if anyone, they voted for in 2016 (b) who, if anyone, they intend to vote for in 2020, (c) how they evaluate Donald Trump's performance /Joe Biden's likely performance in various policy content areas, (d) who they believe Jesus would vote for in the upcoming election, and (e) how they evaluate the 2020 Democratic candidate (Joe Biden) versus the 2016 Democratic candidate (Hillary Clinton). Candidate order and response options were randomized across respondents to prevent order effects.

Survey Sampling and Margins of Error

A total of 1430 respondents (792 Evangelicals and 638 Catholics) were surveyed online between August 11-26th 2020. All respondents were registered voters at their current address and resided in one of 5 swing states: Florida, Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania or Wisconsin. 262 to 308 surveys were conducted in each state. Unique quotas for gender, age, and ethnicity were created¹ for Evangelicals and Catholics in each state based on Pew Research Center's 2014 Religious Landscape Study² and Harvard University's 2018 CCES survey.³ Using this method, the sample was matched to the specific demographic profile (gender, age, ethnicity) and overall ratio of Evangelicals to Catholics in each state. The margin of error for the total sample (combined across states) is +/-2.59% at a 95% confidence level. The margin of error for state-level estimates is +/-5.66% at a 95% confidence level. Data collection occurred online with survey respondents provided by Dynata and Prodege.




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Key Findings

- How Evangelicals and Catholics intend to vote in 2020 compared with their 2016 vote (see Tables 12, 13, and 17)
 - The 2020 election is currently on track to produce an 11% swing towards Biden compared with 2016 among Evangelicals and Catholics, averaging across both Christian denominations and all 5 swing states surveyed.
 - Among swing state Catholics, 2020 is currently on track to produce a +16% swing towards Joe Biden over the 2016 result (see Plot 1). Specifically, whereas Clinton lost Catholics to Trump in 2016 (R 50%/D 36%), Biden is on track to win Catholics (R 43%/D 45%).
 - Among swing state Evangelicals, 2020 is currently on track to produce a +7% swing towards Joe Biden over the 2016 result (see Plot 2). Whereas Clinton lost Evangelicals to Trump by a large margin in 2016 (R 59%/D 25%), Biden is on track to lose that group by a narrower margin (R 59%/D 33%).

Plot 2: Evangelical change in voting patterns between 2016-2020.


- How Evangelicals and Catholics rate the presidential candidates on the 7 cardinal virtues (kindness, generosity, humility, chastity, modesty, diligence and patience; see Tables 1 and 3a-3c).
 - On average, across all virtues, 50% of respondents rated Biden as more virtuous than Trump, and 39% rated Trump as more virtuous than Biden.
 - The largest gap between candidates emerged for the virtues of humility and modesty. Specifically:
 - 49% of respondents view Biden as higher on humility than Trump and 22% perceive Trump as having more humility than Biden.
 - 44% of respondents view Biden as more modest than Trump and 22% perceive Trump as more modest than Biden.
 - Breaking out Catholics and Evangelicals, Catholics view Biden as more virtuous than Trump, whereas Evangelicals view both candidates as about equally virtuous.
 - Among Catholics, 55% rate Biden as more virtuous than Trump, and 34% rate Trump as more virtuous than Biden.
 - Among Evangelicals, 45% rate Biden as more virtuous than Trump, and 44% rate Trump as more virtuous than Biden.

- How Evangelicals and Catholics rate the presidential candidates on the 7 deadly sins (lust, sloth, greed, wrath, gluttony, envy and pride; See Tables 2 and 3d-3f).
 - On average, across all sins, 51% rated Trump as more sinful than Biden, and 37% of respondents rated Biden as more sinful than Trump.
 - The largest gap between candidates emerged for the sins of pride and anger. Specifically,
 - 49% of respondents view Trump as more prideful than Biden, whereas 20% perceive Biden as more prideful than Trump.
 - 48% of respondents view Trump as more angry than Biden and 22% perceive Biden as more angry than Trump.
 - Breaking out Catholics and Evangelicals, both Catholics and Evangelicals rate Trump as more sinful than Biden, although the difference is larger among Catholics.
 - Among Catholics, 57% rate Trump as more sinful than Biden, and 32% rate Biden as more sinful than Trump.
 - Among Evangelicals, 46% rate Trump as more sinful than Biden, and 41% rate Biden as more sinful than Trump.

• Which sins and virtues are, statistically, the strongest predictors of religious voters defecting from Trump in 2020:

- A series of logistic regression models identified the perceived sins and virtues (for both Trump and Biden) that are the biggest drivers of 2016 Trump voters defecting in 2020 (i.e., switching to Biden/not voting/voting for a third party). Among all 7 virtues and all 7 sins for both candidates, the perception that Trump lacks basic Christian <u>kindness</u> is the strongest driver of defecting from Trump in 2020 (see Plot 3). Indeed, 7 out of the top 8 predictors of Trump 2016 voters defecting concern Trump's perceived absence of Christian virtues (rather than the presence of Christian sin or any perceptions of Biden's virtues or sins).
 - The single sin making the list of top 8 predictors was the perception of Trump as <u>lustful</u>.
 - Overall, these results suggest that disaffected Trump voters may generally be willing to forgive Trumps' perceived sins (except lust), but not his perceived lack of basic Christian virtues (especially kindness).
 - This pattern was consistent across both Catholics and Evangelicals, as well as across males and females
 - This pattern was also present for younger and older respondents alike, but especially strong among older respondents who are more likely to defect from Trump because of a perceived lack of Christian virtue.

• Who Evangelicals and Catholics think Jesus would vote for in 2020 (see Table 9):

- Across Evangelicals and Catholics, 28% say Jesus would vote for Donald Trump in 2020 and 27% say that he would vote for Joe Biden. 23% say that Jesus would not vote and 22% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/don't know.
- Breaking out Catholics and Evangelicals, Catholics are more likely to report that Jesus would vote for Biden, whereas Evangelicals are more likely to say that he would vote for Trump. Specifically,
 - Among Catholics, 25% say Jesus would vote for Donald Trump in 2020 and 35% say he would vote for Joe Biden. 21% say Jesus would not vote and 19% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/don't know.
 - Among Evangelicals, 31% say Jesus would vote for Donald Trump in 2020 and 20% say he would vote for Joe Biden. 24% say Jesus would not vote and 25% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/unsure/don't know.
- How Evangelicals and Catholics perceive the 2016 Democratic candidate (Hillary Clinton) compared with the 2020 Democratic Candidate (Joe Biden; See table 16):

- Across Evangelicals and Catholics, 46% say they have a more favorable opinion of Biden than Clinton, 11% say they have a more favorable opinion of Clinton than Biden, and 43% say that their opinion of both candidates is about the same.
- Breaking out Catholics and Evangelicals, both groups generally see Biden more favorably than Clinton, but this gap is larger for Catholics than Evangelicals. Specifically,
 - Among Catholics, 49% say they have a more favorable opinion of Biden than Clinton, 11% say they have a more favorable opinion of Clinton than Biden, and 40% say that their opinion of both candidates is about the same.
 - Among Evangelicals, 45% say they have a more favorable opinion of Biden than Clinton, 11% say they have a more favorable opinion of Clinton than Biden, and 45% say that their opinion of both candidates is about the same.

The following tables represent candidates' virtue and sin ratings. Ratings shown in Table 1 and 2 are pooled across all virtue items or all sin items.

Virtues

2. In 2020, who is shifting in Florida?

- Among Florida Catholics, the 11% 2020 shift towards Biden is fueled jointly by:6
 - 2016 Trump voters moving away from Trump: 8% of Florida Catholics voted for Trump in 2016 but don't intend to in 2020.
 - 2016 third party and non-voters intending to switch to Biden: 2% of Florida Catholics didn't vote for either major party candidate (e.g. didn't vote/voted for a third party candidate) but intend to vote for Biden in 2020.
- Among Florida Evangelicals, the 12% 2020 shift towards Biden is fueled jointly by:
 - 2016 Trump voters moving away from Trump: 10% of Florida Evangelicals voted for Trump in 2016 but don't intend to in 2020.
 - 2016 third party and non-voters intending to switch to Biden: 5% of Florida Evangelicals didn't vote for either major party candidate (e.g. didn't vote/voted for a third party candidate) but now intend to vote for Biden in2020.
- 3. What virtues and sins differentiate Trump and Biden in the eyes of Florida Evangelicals and Catholics (see Table A2)?
 - Biden is seen as more virtuous than Trump on 6 out of 7 virtues and less sinful than Trump on 6 out 7 sins.
 - Biden and Trump are perceived to differ most on the virtues of humility (Biden 30% more than Trump) and patience (Biden 21% more than Trump).
 - On sins, they differ most on pride (Trump 30% more than Biden) and anger (Trump 29% more than Biden).

4. Who do Florida Evangelicals and Catholics say Jesus would vote for in 2020?

- Overall, 26% say Jesus would vote for Donald Trump in 2020 and 30% say that he would vote for Joe Biden. 23% say that Jesus would not vote and 21% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/don't know.
- Biden voters are more likely to say that their vote would align with Jesus': 70% of intended Biden voters say that Jesus would vote for Biden as well, compared with 50% of intended Trump voters who say that Jesus would vote for Trump.

⁶ Note: The overall "Pro-Biden Shift" numbers for Catholics and Evangelicals do not equal the sum of 2016 Trump defectors and 2016 third-party/non-voters breaking for Biden because (a) some respondents were too young to vote in 2016, (b) Trump has gained a small number of 2016 Clinton voters and (c) Trump has gained a small number of 2016 third-party/nonvoters. The overall Pro-Biden Shift values incorporate these pro-Trump shifts to arrive at an overall, net gain figure for Biden.

- 13% of intended Biden voters say that Jesus would not vote, 17% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/unsure/don't know, and 0% say that Jesus would vote for Donald Trump.
- 27% of intended Trump voters say that Jesus would not vote, 19% say that Jesus would be equally likely to vote for either candidate/unsure/don't know, and 3% say that Jesus would vote for Joe Biden.
